# **Message from our Headteacher**

Dear Parents, Carers and Members of our Community



As we near the end of this academic year, it gives me the perfect opportunity to reflect on the successes over the past year.

A key focus of the school this year has been the development of Early Reading through the implementation of our phonics program. As part of this, we have been involved with one of the English hubs, which has seen the school benefit from £6000 of funding. This has allowed us to invest heavily in the reading materials that support our phonics program, Little Wandle. We strongly believe in laying the correct foundations for early reading and are delighted that this has been reflected in our Year 1 Phonics Check this term with results exceeding the national average. We are also extremely grateful to the PTFA and parish council who have both donated significantly to see improvements in the texts offered to children to support the wider curriculum. In addition to the phonics results, we have been thrilled with the results from the other year groups across the school, including Early Years, Year 4 Multiplication check, and the Key Stage Two SATs. All the children have worked extremely hard this year and we could not be prouder of the progress they have made.

As well as providing an ambitious curriculum that supports the academic development of our pupils, we are also keen on their personal development. During the term, we have welcomed visits from the Somerset Library Service to share information regarding the summer reading challenge and the RNLI to deliver their water safety workshop. Our Key Stage Two classes enjoyed a wonderful visit to the Bristol Museum where they got to explore the exhibits and take part in workshops linked to Ancient Greece and Ancient Egypt. Kingfisher class participated in the Kingfisher project and Year 6 enjoyed an activity day at Black Rock Outdoors. The whole school participated in our sports day which was kindly supported by Year 9 students from Haygrove. Well done to Hawkridge who were the overall winners on the day. We also held our KS2 swimming gala at Quantock Lodge – well done to Durleigh on this occasion for being overall winners.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish our Year 6 leavers all the very best as move onto secondary school. They have been delightful and have worked so hard to achieve wonderful outcomes. Thank you to all rest of the pupils for their enthusiasm and commitment to learning and thank you to the staff. It is a





joy to work alongside such committed individuals who care so deeply for the children of Spaxton and are always looking for ways to enhance and deepen their educational experiences. And finally, thank you to the families and wider community, including our Governors, for your continued support.

# **Updates from the classes:**

# **Starling**

This half term we have been learning about the seaside and our oceans. We have been looking at the impact plastic is having on the sea life that lives there, alongside how Greta Thunberg became famous for her views on the environment. We have made posters to remind people of the importance of recycling and we have written a letter to the Prime Minister to ask him to do more to protect our ocean sea life. We will be finishing the year with a steam train trip to Minehead which we are hoping the weather will be kind to us!

# Kingfisher

Kingfisher class has had a very busy and productive half term. We have participated in the Kingfisher Award at

Home Farm in Curry Rivel, creating an eye-catching display of all of our work linked to food production, farming and wildlife. We spent a day at the Bristol Museum and Gallery exploring the world of Ancient Egypt, getting to handle ancient artifacts and discovering how they used to live. In English, we have been enhancing our poetic writing using the book Marshmallow Clouds by Connie Wanek and Ted Kooser and looking at the devices used such as metaphors, alliteration and personification to create imagery. We have finished our maths journey by creating board games using the mathematical skills we have developed throughout the year as well as the year 4's achieving great scores in our Multiplication checks.



# **Peregrine**

This term, Peregrine class has continued to flourish and achieve in all areas of the curriculum. In English, the children have been performing and creating rhythmic poetry based on the poet Karl Nova and have written some excellent instructions about how to capture a wolf and diary writing packed full of suspense. In maths, the children have been looking at decimals and the lifelong skill of converting units e.g. metres to kilometres. In DT, they have been looking at pulleys and gears and are currently constructing ancient Greek homes from matchsticks including a pulley







system. In History, the children have explored life in Ancient Greece and have become familiar with the way of life at this time.

As part of our wider curriculum, year 6 leavers had the pleasure of visiting Black Rock Adventure Centre at Goathurst and threw themselves into the challenges of high ropes, archery and paddle boarding. To draw the busy year to a close, the class are working hard to prepare for their upcoming production of 'Frankie and Me', which they are excited to perform to their family and friends.

### **Attendance**



We know that good attendance leads to good outcomes for children. Children learn best if they are in school regularly and avoid gaps in their learning. We have set ourselves an ambitious target to achieve at least 95% this year. We are still just below this target but there has definitely been an improvement in attendance over the last term so thank you for your support in this. You can continue to help us reach our target by minimizing the number of sessions your child misses each year. No one can help being poorly and it is important to





stay at home if you are sick, but other absences such as holidays or appointments should be avoided, wherever possible.

From the start of the next academic year, I will be required to follow new statutory guidance released from the DfE regarding attendance. This includes a much stricter approach to attendance. The Department for Education expects children to attend school every day that it is open - unless they are ill. From August, all schools will be obliged to consider a fine when a pupil misses 10 or more school sessions for unauthorised reasons. A session counts as either a morning or an afternoon in school. Therefore 10 missed sessions are the equivalent to five whole days of school. These sessions do not need to be consecutive.

As the Headteacher, I will only be able to grant a leave of absence for exceptional circumstances and the DfE do not consider holidays to be exceptional. The current penalty is £60 per parent, which rises to £120 if not paid within 21 days. From August 2024, when the new policy is introduced, the fine for school absences across the country will rise to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid within 28 days.

Under the new rules, education chiefs are also pledging to tackle repeat offenders and those who may choose to regularly allow their children to miss school in favour of paying the fine. If a parent is given a second fine for the same child within a three-year period, this fine will be charged at the higher rate of £160 with no option for a discount if paid early. Fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action like a parenting order or prosecution may be considered. If you're prosecuted and have to attend court because your child hasn't been going to school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500.

On the other hand, we are going to be looking at ways we can promote and celebrate excellent attendance so please do look out for these in the Autumn term.

### **Free School Meals**

Is your child entitled to free school meals? Please note this is different from the universal free school meals that children in Starling class receive.

Parents and carers who receive any of the following are entitled to free school meals:

- Income Support (IS)
- Employment and Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Universal Credit with an annual household income of less than £7400 after tax
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance (IBJSA)
- Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit, with an annual taxable income (as assessed by HMRC) of less than £16,190





It is the responsibility of the parents or carers to register their entitlement and request free school meals for their children. If you think this could be you, please go to the Somerset Council website: <u>Free School Meals</u> to apply.
